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SECTION A: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY- SWOC ANALYSIS

Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya, Raiganj, West Bengal submits Self Study Report (SSR) for accreditation by NAAC for the first cycle in December, 2015. This SSR has been a product of a humble and honest effort for ensuring academic excellence in the face of all challenges that a backward district along the Bangladesh international border, with a sizeable minority population, and a very low literacy rate invariably pose before us.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- The College offers 12 courses with Honours, 6 general courses (B.A. /B.Sc.) at U.G. level.
- Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya follows the curricula designed by University of Gour Banga. A number of faculty members of the college are in the Board of Studies of the University taking part in framing and modifying curricula as and when necessary.
- The College runs from 11AM to 5.00PM, from Monday to Saturday.
- Study Centre of Distance Education of Rabindra Bharati University is operating in the college.
- The College also offers UGC sponsored Coaching Programmes for Remedial coaching, coaching for entry in services etc.
- The College also offers vocational courses in engineering and technology (ET) at the 10+2 level, sponsored by West Bengal Council of Vocational Education Training.
- The college has one language lab for training and enhancing speaking and writing skills in English.

TEACHING, LEARNING & EVALUATION

Efforts are constantly made to keep all the aspects of this most important facet of education on the desired level of excellence despite all circumstantial impediments.

- Absolute transparency is observed in all affairs relating to admission procedure, such as, advertising date and time, submission of application forms, Preparing Merit list and counselling with alert attention to justice and student welfare.
- Admission to the Vocational Courses equal to 10+2 level class course in engineering and technology (ET) is made under direct supervision of the West Bengal Council of Vocational Education Training.
- That the College is the first choice to majority of students is proved by high merit marks of the applicants admitted to this college and the infrastructure conducive for learning.
- Attempts are made to identify and meet the individual requirements of both the advanced and backward students of a class through class tests and extra hours of teaching.
- There are two seminar rooms equipped with projectors which are shared across the departments.
- In some departments, MCQ test is taken in compliance with the competitive exams that are offered across the country.
- Arrangements for modern technology-aided teaching methods are made increasingly.
- Measures for encouraging students to use library facilities to its full extent are being adopted. Installation of computers, Wi-Fi connectivity in all departments is a positive step towards student welfare.
- Teacher-parent meet at departmental level and grievance redressal mechanism in general are effective sources of feedback.

 Cultural Programmes, sports events and academic Seminars arranged on regular basis to help and to build up the students' personality.

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- The College encourages faculty to take part in the research activities. A number of teachers are engaged in UGC Minor Research projects and other research works.
- Seminars at regular intervals, publication of magazines, student-based wallmagazines with original and creative contributions and special library facilities for scholars are efforts to encourage research activities in the college.

STRENGTH

- A sprawling three-storied building with three galleries, smart class room, a separate guest house, a spacious canteenand one playground is a source of right kind of academic ambience.
- Tradition of perfect order and discipline within campus is a legacy that the students instinctively learn to uphold.
- The College is very meticulous to maintain an ideal condition in the examination halls.
- The Teachers and the administrative staff are easily accessible to the students, creating a homely atmosphere in the campus.
- ✤ NSS is quite actively engaged in welfare programmes.
- As no incident smacking of indiscipline or moral turpitude is reported to occur in the college precincts students prefer this college to others in the vicinity.

WEAKNESS

- Number of staff both in the teaching and administrative category is not adequate for the number of students the college has to accommodate.
- Size and number of rooms available are not adequate for the various requirements arising with introduction of new courses and programmes.

- Students from backward communities constitute a large portion of enrolment, posing difficulties for the teachers in class teaching.
- Scarcity of teaching days, because of lengthy examination schedule and evaluation process, is an insoluble problem.
- Students from distant areas show tendency to irregularity in class attendance.

OPPORTUNITIES

- Well-enriched library serve the requirement both of the average and advanced students.
- The college offers a large number of courses and subject-combination options to ensure horizontal mobility in course choice.
- Financial helps are provided in fee for the needy students.
- Placement and Guidance cell creates in the students an awareness of the current situation in job - market.
- Advance students develop interest in research from the UGC projects running in the various departments.

CHALLENGES

- Students demand and want of sufficient number of colleges in the district make it difficult for the college to impose limit to admission, particularly in general course.
- A section of students is irregular in class attendance because of family condition and sometimes because of intellectual immaturity. Measures like Guardian– Teacher meet and Individual counselling do not click always in this regard.
- Conventional examination system does not always create in the student a knack for free thinking which is important for personality development. Measures for developing intellectual power for applied purpose appear insufficient.

Criterion -I Curricular Aspects

1.1Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the Institution and describe how these are communicated to students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Vision

Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya (RSM) is committed to the pursuit of excellence in higher education, character building, development of personality and responsible citizenship. The vision statement of the college is depicted in our college emblem which includes an ink-pen and an eye entitled 'RSM' (Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya) in the middle surrounded by four bright suns. The ink-pen resembles power of knowledge and eye means inner vision. The four bright suns depicted in the emblem resemble educational activities, cultural activities, games and sports activities and social services.

Mission

- To spread basic higher education through limited capacity of the institution among the local community.
- To provide value based, job oriented quality education to economically and socially backward section of the society especially to down trodden.
- To empower the students through modern learning techniques and participation in curricular-extracurricular activities.
- To build good character and moral value of the young generation of the society through not only quality education but also games and sports activity.

Objectives

- ✤ To develop a learner friendly environment within the college premises.
- ✤ To provide every possible infrastructure, recommended by the Government, to all

the learners with the limited resource of the institution.

- To maintain optimum transparency in admission of students and faculty appointments (guest), upholding merit as the foremost criterion.
- To bring awareness among students regarding the social, political, economic, and environmental realities of contemporary world the college has conducted various cultural activities, awareness camps, go to the village programme through NSS wings, etc.
- To maintain a robust work culture, discipline combined with freedom of thought and expression, and sense of national consciousness.

The vision andmission statement iscommunicated to the stake holders through management – staff meetings, interaction with students, meetings of Alumni association and various programmes arranged for local community. The general administrative body and various committees of the college deal the policy matters. The college is running by a Governing Body which is formed as per rule and meet at regular intervals to discuss the administrative matters and development of the institution.

The college has a large number of scholarships to promote the pursuit of excellence. Innumerable scholarly activities –including seminars, conferences and workshops-are organized to reinforce this. In all of these, students and teachers work closely together. Tutorials and lectures are conducted with utmost regularity. This total ambience distinguished by an earnest and dedicated attitude to work as well as to the welfare of students is the most powerful communication there can be.

1.1.2. How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya, being an affiliated college, does not have the freedom to develop its own curriculum. Even so, efforts are made, within the limitations of the prescribed framework, to complement the curriculum wherever felt to be necessary. This task is left to the initiative of departments.

The college is located in economically upcoming region with down trodden back ground. The students approaching the college come from rural and majority of them are first generation learners. A large number of students seek self-employment; therefore, courses are so designed thatthey can generate employment opportunities for themselves as well as for the community from the establishment. The college has been working on these lines and it is well exhibited in student support and value orientation.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/ or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The most important support that a teacher may aspire to is an over-all institutional culture and commitment to the pursuit of excellence, combined with discipline. Teachers are also given sufficient freedom to use their capacity for initiative and innovation in the way they teach. The institution endeavours to the utmost to ensure that no impediments remain in the way of efficient teaching. The massive renovation of the college infrastructure as well as the up-gradation of lab facilities in the recent years is a case in point. The research interests of teachers are encouraged and their achievements specially applauded.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

Efforts are made to ensure that the curriculum is implemented efficiently and innovatively. This includes a wide variety of things from the recruitment of faculty, work culture, institutional vision, supervision and review through departmental meetings – Student-Faculty-Committee meetings as well as the Principal's meeting with departments-the efficient functioning of the tutorial system. Teachers of the college are also on the Board of Studies, formed by the University that deals with the curriculum in different subjects.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry.

Such interfaces have been, in the past, on a low key. On institutional level, the college has no regular transaction with other organizations with curriculum link, except the University to which it is affiliated. Interaction with various organizations also occurs through resource persons in the seminars organized periodically.

Feedbacks from all stakeholders are invited in the college website. Many of the teachers of our college are in different BoS itself. Teachers of the college interacts with the other members of the Board of Studies (BoS) in this matter. Seven subject teachers are the member of Board of Studies of University of Gour Banga.

As an affiliated college there is no such scope to develop curriculum for any course.

The departments hold class tests on the subjects taught and form an idea of the students' individual grasp. The students with apparent deficiency are counselled outside the class

or they are recommended to join the UGC assisted Remedial Coaching, which is offered in the college.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

The college has tried to equip the students to compete in the global employment market by introducing advanced professional courses in computer application and spoken English. The college offers a wide range of short term computer courses for the development of need based computing skill including DOECC in 'PC Application' in collaboration with WEBEL informatics from 2004. These courses utilized relevant inclusion an integration of information and communication technology (ICT) in the curriculum. The college has started 'English Language Proficiency Certificate' (ELPC) course in 2013 with around forty students.

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If yes, give details.

As per the statute of University of GourBanga there is no provision for pursuing dual degree programmes simultaneously, and therefore, the college does not offer any such programme.

1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability.

The college has under graduate programs in Arts and Science faculties as prescribed by GourBanga University. It offers 11 different programs in the Arts faculty 6 programs in Science faculty. The college has been associated with DDE RabindraBharati University, Kolkata for its M.A courses in Bengali, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Geography and Environmental Science from 2005. The range of option in connection with Core and Elective Subjects as granted by the University is also offered by the college, except minor restrictions that are imposed for the sake of framing an integrated class schedule. It has two NSS units with around two hundred students. The college also has UGC assisted enrichment programmes, such as, Remedial Coaching, Coaching for Entry in Services and Coaching for NET & SET.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If yes, list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The college offers three short term need based self-financed courses designed and run by the institution, such as:

- Spoken English Course (ELPC)
- Vocational course
- PC Application course

In these short term courses the curriculums designed by the college with specific objectives keeping in view the vision & mission of the college and the local need.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If yes, provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

The college has started short term certificates courses such as UGC sponsored S.C, S.T. coaching for competitive examinations, PC Application and ELPC. Also the college has set up a Career Guidance Cell for guidance to the students in choosing careers and courses after graduation to prepare students for state/national level competitive examination. They help the students to seek employment opportunities after graduation. These programs provide the additional options to the students in competitive exams, computer literacy, communication skills etc.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice? If yes, how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

As an affiliated college of University of GourBanga there is no provision for combining regular and distance modes of education.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

This happens only to a limited extent and much of it happens in an informal way. Departments are encouraged to integrate complementary material in the courses prescribed, wherever they find it necessary. Seminars, conferences and workshops are conducted by a host of subject-societies and general ones to enhance classroom learning and to enlarge the range of their awareness, concerns and expertise.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

This question has already been dealt with under 1.2.1 and 1.2.5.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

A wide range of topics are covered expertly through high powered programmes organized under the auspices of various departments and clubs. The college has formed the Nature club, Cine club, Research and Consultancy group, Women cell, etc., in last few months. Through these bodies, we have some plan to implement in future.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

The college has observes several days of national importance with due respect through its NSS wings such as Independence Day, Republic Day, Teachers day, World Environment Day, and many more. The students of our college also participate in the Mock Parliament, Science Fair, state and university level quiz competition and annual sports meet, etc. The Department of Bengali celebrates the International Language Day in every year. The students union of this college celebrates the social cultural programme and departmental exhibition in which respective teachers of the departments also guided the students to plan the theme of the exhibition.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

As an affiliated institution the college has no scope for enriching the curriculum. However, the college has an active and continual feedback system through the Student – Faculty Committees. The scheme of teachers self-appraisal is an operation. It has also introduced the scheme of student's feedback about the teacher's performance and other important issues like curricular aspect, student support. The feedback of the students are properly analyzed and made available to the teachers to act upon.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

- Through the Principal/TIC obtaining in person the feedback from various departments by meeting and interacting with them on a departmental basis.
- The IQAC ensures that the students participate in these enrichment programmes and derive maximum benefit from them.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Various faculty members of this college have been involved in evolving curricula for various courses. At present we have seven faculties who are the members of the UG Board of Studies of University of GourBanga.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If yes, how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The regular report from the college Internal Quality Assurance Cellis a long way in helping the college in its policy formation for Quality Education. The student's feedback regarding teachers is analyzed and discussed regarding the evaluative comments. The feedback taken is actively discussed in the formation of syllabus meeting held by various formation committee convey the feedback at university level.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya follows the policy of the Government of West Bengal, and University of Gour Banga for the admission of students to various under graduate programmes. The institution gives wide publicity to the admission process through notification in college website and notice boards. The provisional merit lists are exhibited on the notice boards of the college, and in the website. Merit list is prepared as per a formula framed by the University. Complaints if any regarding the merit points assigned are considered and changes are affected, if required. Students are informed of the date of counselling, admission and other required information through notice board and / or website.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The admission procedure is as per the university rule. Applications for admissions to undergraduate programmes are called just after publication of Higher Secondary result. After scrutinizing applications, provisional merit lists of students are published. At the time of counselling it is ensured that the students get equal and enough opportunity to select their first choice among the four subjects they applied for in a single admission form. A student can switch over to a new subject even after opting for another, in case any vacancy occurs in his chosen subjects because of such exercise of options at the time of counselling until the vacancies are all filled. The whole process is supervised by the Admission Committee of the college. The process of admission is fully computerized. 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.






The institution assures that all admissions done are as per the norms and regulations of University of Gour Banga and the State Government. Students are admitted to each programme after careful scrutiny of their credentials and qualifications, and the admission process is undertaken by the Admission Committee, which meticulously reviews the process. At the end of the admission process, profile of the students and the admission process is reviewed by the admission committee, and corrective actions are proposed to be implemented for the next year.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion

Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya upholds the spirit of the constitution of India. The genuine concern for equity can be seen in the admission process of the college.







2.1.6 Provide the following details for various programmes offered by the institution during the last four years and comment on the trends. i.e. reasons for increase / decrease and actions initiated for improvement.

Over last several years, it has been observed that the demand for admission to the General courses and Humanities is very high at Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya. But, number of applications for admission to Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya has increased significantly in last few years, mainly in the Honours courses, both in science and humanities, though the demand for admission to this college is higher in comparison to other colleges in the district. But there is a huge and increasing demand for admission to general course in humanities since long. Reasons behind this trend are as follows –

- Huge scope for admission to engineering courses within the state.
- Most of the students aim to pursue their higher studies in major cities, like Kolkata, Malda, etc.
- Flourish of distance education mode.
- Fall in demand for the subjects such as Economics, Philosophy, Sanskrit etc, in view of shortage of scope in employment though School Service Commission which is one of the largest provider of recruitment in the state of West Bengal.
- Migration of a number of students to various courses mainly in Kolkata.

To cater to the high demand for higher education in the district, the college strives to start more UG programmes in the campus, and few PG course in near future. In view of existing demand of the students, the college hosts a study centre for the distance education course of Rabindra Bharati University, West Bengal.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to Government policies in this regard?

The institution is sensitive towards the needs of the differently-abled students. Their applications for admission are considered and such students have been given admitted in the previous years as per rules. Necessary arrangements for easy mobility and convenient seating of differently-abled students are made. Office attendants are specifically available for helping differently-abled students. Library is equipped with specially designed study materials for differently-abled students.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students^[2] needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If "yes^[2], give details on the process.

On the first day of the session teachers of each department together meet the new students in an orientation programme to acquaint them to the campus life. On this occasion discussions regarding the course curriculam and its future prospect, individual knack and educational background of the students are held. In some departments, regular class tests are conducted to assess the knowledge and skills of newly admitted students and accordingly, remedial classes are organized for the students who score below the required level in the class test.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge / Remedial/ Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.)

The college conducts several remedial classes, special lectures by guest faculties to improve the knowledge level of the students.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc?

Awareness programmes are organized by Women's cell and IQAC to sensitize its students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. NSS unit of the College take special care to keep the campus green, clean and plastic free by regular vigilance and occasional drives and programmes. The college has already opened Anti-ragging Cell, Women's cell and grievance cell.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified through class test results and day to day interaction. For such students, additional tutorial classes are organized. The college offers e-books and internet (both LAN and wi-fi) facility which provides sufficient exposure to our advanced learners. Students are encouraged to participate in the seminars, model exhibition and other academic programmes.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The students who are at the risk of drop out are identified through regular interaction in classes as well as by analyzing the student progression data of exam results. The college provides half free in tuition fees to a number of needy students. They are also encouraged to apply in different Government schemes for financial help.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The academic programmes of the college are based on the academic calendar of Gour Banga University. A detailed academic calendar is prepared at the college level and at the department level. Modular curriculum plan is also developed. Teaching Plan is supplied to the students. Planning and preparation is done for laboratory works. Charts and procedures for all the experiments are prepared and made available to students. Test examination before the University Exam is regularly held. The final evaluation of students is done according to the university schedule. The results of examinations are declared and score cards are issued by the university.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC cell, Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya was initially formed in a meeting of teachers and Principal. Subsequently two external members were selected for the same as per UGC /NAAC norms. For smooth functioning of academic affairs of the college IQAC has formed various cells. IQAC conducts several seminars and workshops. In addition, IQAC also reviews the progress on the modular curriculum plan and suggests corrective actions for any deviations.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya believes in the motto of building up personal relationship between teachers and students. Usual chalk and talk method is supplemented by audio visual aids. All the departments take tutorial classes where elaborate interaction between students and teachers help the learners to discern and rectify their weaknesses. Students are encouraged to meet the teachers outside the class. All the departments are connected with internet facility (either LAN or Wi-Fi) along with at least one desktop. The college has two conference halls (MILANAYATAN and RABINDRA KAKHO) with necessary equipments of smart class, which is utilized by all the departments as and when required. Mainly the science departments take classes through power point slides. The students are able to go online and access information from library.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The various academic and co-academic programs are conducted to help the students to improve their communication skill, analytical ability, moral code of conduct, decision making skill, self esteem and creative thinking. An interdisciplinary approach is encouraged among students through seminars and discussions with teachers of other departments. Occasionally a group of teachers meet the students of various departments to develop in them necessary awareness in academic and ongoing happenings. Leadership skill and management skill of the students are developed through works like campus beautification, participation in NSS, quiz contest etc.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty members for effective teaching? Eg, Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Two well equipped audio visual class rooms are being used at present. The faculty members in the institution use both conventional aids like blackboard and electronic teaching aids to ensure effective learning experience for students. Through the use of power point presentations, simulation software and the process of teaching-learning is made more interesting and effective. Students have access to internet where they can gather vast amount of information from a number of e-journals and effectively update themselves with current knowledge.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty members exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)? Regional, national, international and college level seminars are conducted at regular interval in the college and students and faculty get opportunity to listen to and interact with the subject experts. Experts from industry and academy are invited to deliver talks and students and faculty members are benefited academically from these sessions. Teachers update themselves through orientation programme, refresher course, faculty development programme, subject based workshop and seminar as prescribed by the UGC. Details of workshops and seminars conducted recently are available in the section 3.1.6

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \ benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/ mentoring/ academic advice) provided to students?

Several students have been supported through different counselling programme.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty members during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty members to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college is well aware of the rapid changes in the field of higher education and research keeping pace with the innovative teaching-learning practices. The following are the measures adopted:

- The faculty members effectively utilize the internet for data collection, preparation of notes and for enhancing the student participation in learning.
- Movies and documentaries particularly in PG section related to the curriculum are exhibited before the classes so that teaching can be made effective and easier.
- Hands-on learning is encouraged through field visits, industrial visits and project works.

- > Students are also prompted to use scanners and printers for academic purposes
- Promotion of student-centric learning through interactive classes, seminars and practical sessions.
- Students are motivated to access e-books.
- Introduction of curriculum planning using a cloud based software.
- Introduction of MCQ test for a number of subjects.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has one central library, which is well equipped, connected with internet facility, and sufficient reading space and congenial ambience. The students can access books, newspapers, journals and magazines from the library, and if required can photocopy the materials. Apart from this, all the major departments of the institution are equipped with books, model question papers, old question papers and schemes of evaluation. New editions are added regularly and the library stock is updated with current volumes. Students are issued books both from the central library.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If "yes", elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college has the practice of covering the syllabi as per lesson/modular plans made with a view to complete the syllabi within available working days, though sometimes classes are hampered due to unavoidable circumstances. Tutorial classes and remedial coaching classes are held to compensate the shortfall.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The faculty members themselves are encouraged to collect the feedback of students for the betterment the teaching learning practice. Faculty members are also advised to improve teaching strategies based on the result analysis of the concerned papers.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

The faculty members of the college are recruited by West Bengal College Service Commission as per the norms framed by UGC and the Government of WB. Temporary lecturers are recruited by the Selection Committee consisting of the Principal / Teacher – in-Charge, the Head of the Department concerned and a subject expert by interviewing eligible candidates. Teachers regularly update themselves by attending orientation programmes, refresher courses, faculty improvement programmes seminars, workshops etc.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty members to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The college encourages existing faculty members to cope with the changes occurring in the syllabi from time to time. New faculty is recruited as guest lecturers whenever any new course is introduced in the college. Relevant portion of the syllabus of the new programme are taken up by the existing faculty of other departments as per convenience. 2.4.3 Provide details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg. providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement, etc.)

Teachers are supported to receive research grants from UGC and other academic bodies, and two of our teachers are running their Minor Research Projects funded by UGC. Four of our teachers are engaged in doctoral research. One faculty member is at the final stage of submission of his thesis under FIP scheme being relieved by the college. The college facilitates research activities and encourages teachers to attend and present papers in seminars and conferences. Most of our faculty members have published works in reputed journals and eight of them have authored / edited academic books.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty members who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/ achievement of the faculty members.

Awards received so far by the teachers of this college are not exclusively related to teaching excellence. However, the institutional emphasis on the effort to develop excellence in teaching by various measures and methods adopted from time to time certainly inspired and motivate the teachers to bring out the best in them.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The college has started multi steps interactive evaluation systems for teachers. The basic steps are -

- Feedback from students
- Feedback from Self
- Feedback from Peers
- Feedback from Principal

Accordingly, complacency score and competency scores are created for each faculty. The institution collects feedback at the end of each year through specially designed questionnaire, and the data thus received is reviewed by the faculty members concerned and required alterations in teaching strategies and methods are effected in the subsequent years. The procedure facilitates better transaction of learning materials in and out of the classroom and creates better academic ambience.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty members are aware of the evaluation processes?

The evaluation methods are informed to the students well in advance before the university examinations. The previous university examination question papers and model questions are made available to the students in the departmental libraries. The students are informed of class tests and assignments. Students are also informed of the schemes of evaluation, updates on curriculum revision, alterations in the question patterns and do's and don'ts during practical examinations.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

University has introduced UG programme Annual System (1+1+1) in the year 2004, before which it was (2+1) system. In 2014, home centre has been abolished for the University Examination. The institution has adopted these reforms and follows the system meticulously. Some departments has started MCQ test.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

Being an affiliated college, it follows the rules prescribed by the university in connection with the implementation of examination. Exam Committee is constituted comprising teaching and non-teaching members of the staff for smooth functioning and implementation of the policies adopted. Principal/Teacher-in-Charge acts as centre in charge.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Departments conduct mainly class test as part of the formative evaluation of the UG programme in the college. As a result, the students can face the examinations without fright and can gather thorough understanding of the subject. For the practical examinations, sufficient exposure to the examination is provided by the departments

concerned and it is helpful to the students to perform well during the University examinations.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The college observes strict discipline in the whole examination procedure. The students are encouraged to grow the habit of taking examination with full seriousness and integrity. The system of *away centres* in the examination has been implemented by the university in order to maintain sanctity of the examination system.

2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Apart from the learning side of the curriculum as specified by the university college takes care of the building of the students' personality through various usual campus activities, such as cultural programmes, athletics organized by the Students' Union, extension programmes arranged by the college and academic programmes arranged by the departments.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Written grievances are submitted by the students, and considered by the cell. The Grievance Cell considers complaints of students. After result is published, the university announces a specific time schedule for re-evaluation in a proforma along with fees, which is submitted to the university by the college.

Each department prepares a result sheet of the Test Examination for Honours students which is mainly used for purpose of the filling the individual university examination forms. 2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

For a number of subjects, modular curriculum is developed with clearly stated learning outcome for each module. The college aims to orient the young students towards academic excellence, personality development and social commitment. The curriculum and the syllabi of the academic programmes offered in this college are transacted in such a way that these objectives are realized by the successful completion of the programmes. These learning outcomes are communicated to the students' right from the beginning of the academic programmes during the fresher's welcome and the departmental orientation session.

Ours is an economically backward district where most of the students hail from the needy section of the society. Expenses of higher education are made bearable to the poor students by financial assistances granted by the college and different schemes of Government. As part of teaching-learning strategy, the institution provides the students with free internet access, photocopy facility at a minimum cost in the library, INFLIBNET, remedial coaching, entry in services facilities and opportunity of interaction with experts through special lecturers, seminars and workshops.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

All the programmes offered in this institution equip the students to undertake jobs and materialize their career ambitions. The college has initiated the practice of holding career and higher education seminars. Career Guidance and Placement Cell has been formed in the campus to enhance the career opportunity and skills of the students. Students are provided with career magazines which enable them to cope with the current trends in the job market. Certificate course is proposed on Basic computer learning to interested students.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The institution collects data on student learning primarily on the basis of the result obtained in the examinations. The college offers academic guidance to those students who fail to complete their programmes through remedial coaching and tutorial classes.

The college monitors and ensures the achievement of learning outcomes by putting emphasis on class attendance, off the class consultation in the departments, occasional class tests, central test examination, guardians' meet held by the departments, encouraging attending the seminar and the model exhibition.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research centre/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

For social studies, the college has a well equipped research centre with high speed internet connectivity, computers, research journals, access to online data etc. For other subjects, the college does not have a research centre currently. However, some of the faculty members are actively engaged in research work. The college is hosting a UGC-Minor Research Project with Abhinandan Das, Department of History, as the Principal Investigator of UGC sponsored Minor Research Project. Dr. Debashri Mondal one of the faculty members of the Department of Zoology is working as a Principal Investigator in a UGC- Minor Research Project. Many individual research works are also ongoing in the college.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes, the institution has a Research Committee named "Research and Consultancy Group" (RCG) to monitor and address the issues of research and consultancy activities. The committee comprises of the Principal/TIC of the college as the Chairman, Principal Investigator of the ongoing UGC Minor Research Projects as the Convener and other faculty members of different departments of the college as members.

The committee encourages as well as assists the faculty members to apply for minor/major research projects. The RCG also collects details of potential funding agencies

in government and private sectors to obtain financial assistance for the research projects of faculty members and students in the college.

It is a sincere endeavour of the committee to organize seminar/ symposia/ conference regularly in order to motivate and attract the faculty members and students towards active research. The committee also extends its support and cooperation to the departments in holding departmental seminars.

Some of the faculty members have shown interest and they are in constant touch with the RCG in regard to preparation of their respective research proposal.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The college is already hosting two Minor Research Projects, funded by UGC, Government of India. The institution has taken various measures to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of the projects. The details are explained below.

• Autonomy to the principal investigator

The college offers maximum autonomy to the principal investigators (PI) to carry out the research work as per the respective projects.

• Timely availability of resources

The college has ensured timely availability of resources for the smooth progress of the project.

Adequate infrastructure and human resources

The college has provided with adequate work space, electricity, broadband internet connection (both wired and wireless), help from administrative staff and computing facilities to the investigators and research scholars of the projects.

• Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers

The college understands the fact that reduced teaching load on the basis of work arrangement and special leaves are required for the faculty members involved in active Research. The teaching departments of the institution provide reduced teaching loads to other PIs of the Minor Research Projects on mutual understanding.

• Support in terms of technology and information needs

The IQAC cell regularly conducts trainings for the faculties involved in research. Although the college has an honest intention to extend support in terms of technology and information needs, it sometimes cannot fulfil the expectations of the researchers only because of lack of fund for the purpose. However, the college has prepared a detailed proposal to the UGC for financial assistance for the purpose.

• Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding agencies.

The college is always sincere to provide with full support for the preparation of utilization certificate and auditing of the research funds. The service of the college administrative staff for the preparation and submission of utilization certificates of the projects is commendable.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The college has endeavoured to improve research aptitude among students by conducting seminars/symposia mentioned in para 3.1.6. The students are given opportunity to interact with the researchers attending such events where they are motivated towards basic research. In some other departments e.g. Botany, Zoology, Sociology, Geography, Education, etc., the students develop research culture through field studies. Successful development of research culture is revealed by the fact that the college has produced competent researchers who are now working world wide in significant positions.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

Nearly 10% of the faculty members have already benefited from leave for their research work. It is observed that the leave availed help them to advance their research work to a notable level due to the uninterrupted involvement in research, while being exempted from teaching loads and examination duties. The active involvement in research during their leave revamp the academicstrength of the faculty members and it directly improves the academic quality of students in the campus on their return.

We have a plan to take such initiatives through our newly formed Planning Board and Research and Consultancy Group in near future.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The college does not have an exclusive budget head for research activity. Minor requirements like computers, internet facilities etc are met by the college. Faculty members, on the other hand, have to meet the major expenditure through financial assistance from external funding agencies. However, the college authority always provides with the infrastructural facilities and administrative support to the researchers leading Research Project. The Planning Board of the college will submit a proposal to UGC under XII Plan provisions for setting up of Central Research Laboratory Facilities in the college very soon.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The Research and Consultancy Group (RCG) of the college has recommended to the college authority for such seed money to the faculty for research. With a positive intention the college authority is working out how to provide such seed money. Till now no such amount has been disbursed.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support studentresearch projects by students?

The College does not have permissible fund to support student research projects directly. However, the student projects are supported, by providing with computers, internet facilities, library service, e-book, e-journal access, etc. The Research and Consultancy Group of the college has recommended to the college authority for direct financial assistance to the student research projects.

3.2.4. How do the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavours and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The research works that many faculty members of the college are engaged in are interdisciplinary in nature.

Apart from these individual research works, several conferences, symposia were organised by different departments that deal with interdisciplinary issues. Following is the list of some of the events that were product of the collaborative efforts-

- 1. The Convention on **To Kill or Not to Kill? Rethinking Capital Punishment and Governance** was jointly conducted by Dept. Of English and Philosophy. It interested students and researchers in the field of political studies, literature and philosophy.
- 2. Regular Screening of Iranian movies, off-beat Indian and vernacular movies drew the attention of students across disciplines. The film club has been successful in stoking up interest regarding movies, world cinema and alternative forms of expression through film and documentary screening.
- 3. Occasional talks organised by different departments are generally chosen on topics that have relevance beyond the immediate discipline. The purpose is to bring to the students to the cutting edge research in newer fields. For example, Dr. Amitranjan Basu of IIAS, Shimla dealt with **Psychoanalysis after Globalisation** whereas we have plans to organise similar events in gender issues, what do we mean by Indian culture and Indian intellectual tradition in near future.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipments and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The research facilities for the experimentalists are not at all adequate due to lack of proper instrumentation. Some facilities are easily available for the theoreticians such as general library, Broad Band, Wi-Fi internet connectivity, software, computing facilities, etc. These are used on a shared basis among students and faculty members. Most of the research related facilities are made available, with priority, to students during their academic project tenure under the supervision of the teachers concerned. Faculty members avail these facilities as and when require.

No, the institution has not received funding from any beneficiary agency or industry so far. However, the institution has formed a Research and Consultancy Group suggested to the College authority to make public appeal for generous contribution for developing research facility in the College.

3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The college has a Centralized Computing Facility (C-Lab) equipped with desk top computers, uninterrupted power supply and necessary softwares. Broadband internet connectivity, e-book, e-journal facilities, printing, copying and scanning facilities and an annually updated general library are available to students and researchers. The students utilize these facilities for carrying out their academic projects.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The College has formed, as per UGC-Guidelines, a Planning Board for proper planning, aiming at overall development of the College. The Board has pointed out some prioritized

areas most significant of which is setting up of Central Research Laboratory Facilities (CRLF). The Board has also recommended for construction of a new Science Block. Consequent upon the proposals/recommendations the college authority has prayed for required fund from UGC. Also the state government schemes are being explored for the purpose. The existing laboratories are being upgraded in respect of renovation, extension, procurement of instruments upto the own capacity of the college. The college is continuously encouraging and assisting the faculty members to apply for financial assistance from the UGC, government departments and other funding agencies in the form of major and minor research projects in emerging fields.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities?? If, yes, what are the instruments/ facilities created during the last four years?

The college has received assistance for enhancing research facilities only from funding agencies, and not from beneficiary agencies.

The college is open to research scholars and students from outside the campus to utilize the facilities available in college for pursuing their projects/research under the guidance of faculty members in the college. The college has also setup Wi-Fi zone in the campus where outside scholars and students can access advanced journals such as Broad-band connection also.

The college has one library for undergraduate courses and research works. The library is annually updated. Various journals and a good collection of digital resources and a large number of books and e-book facilities are available for the readers. The faculty members of the college are also individually extending their consultancy service in respect of research development, data processing to different organizations and individuals. The College has planned to provide such consultancy services through the institution.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The institution offers full support to the faculty members to utilize their expertise for consultancy service. The available resources are freely accessible to the faculty members for their consultancy works. Teaching loads of such faculty members are conveniently adjusted by the departments for pursuing their consultancy services.

3.5.4 List the broad areas and major consultancy services provided by the institution and the revenue generated during the last four years.

The institution provided consultancy services however, no revenue was generated as the services were provided free of cost.

3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

The institution does not yet generated revenue through consultancy services.

3.5.6. Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR).

The college perform several social programmes like – blood donation camp, celebration of – World Environment Day, through NSS.

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhoodcommunity network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Our college is situated in Raiganj, North Dinajpur district of West Bengal which is one of the country's 250 most backward districts (source: —Ministry of Panchayati Raj ||, September 8, 2009). It is reveals that the population of this district is mainly rural (about 80% of total population) and the scheduled caste (SC) and scheduled tribe (ST) population in the district are 27% and 11% respectively. The minority population in the district is about 65% most of which fall in the OBC category. Thus, the backward class communities in the district cover more than 50% of the total population. The SC community in the district consists of 59 sub-communities, the main sub-castes being Rajbanshi, Namasudra, Kaibarta, Malo, Poundra, etc., Santala, Oraon, Mores, Mundas, Malpaharis etc., are the main sub-communities of a total of 38 different sub- communities that constitute the ST population in the district.

The economy of the district is based on agriculture mainly and it is very weak in the sense that it ranks the district as one of the most underdeveloped district in West Bengal. The yield per acre of land is low as reflected in the low per capita income. Backwardness in industrialisation, possession of no mineral resources, shortage of capital and entrepreneurship etc. are the other weaknesses of the economy of the district.

Our college considers that it is our noble duty to shoulder the responsibilities to improve the living conditions through extensive awareness campaigns and other activities. Some of the faculty members are endeavouring for the purpose. The students also participate in these programmes.

Poverty compels a large number of students of our college to become earners for their families although they spend some time in the educational institutions as part-time learners. This is why this section of students is observed to be backward in the education. Our college wishes to take up remedial measures for these backward students mainly hailing from SC/ST/OBC and minoritycommunities of different parts of the district. These

helpless students are deprived of obtaining regular guidance from the end of their families in respect of preparing themselves for higher education in general and jobs/research activities in particular. Our college considers that it is our duty to guide these students towards prosperous future providing Remedial Coaching / CoachingClasses for Entry in Services.

The overall development of the district is possible only when this backward section is uplifted and developed in a proper way based on collective effort. RSM College desires to dedicate itself in this noble job.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The college extends all possible support to the students to involve in social movements that promote citizenship roles. The NSS unit of the college work with a focus on promoting citizenship roles in students. The staff advisor and the coordinators of the respective units track the involvement of the students. The attendance of the students in these activities is registered. The students are also encouraged to participate in National Integration Camps of NSS.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The feedback received from alumni, outgoing students, higher education institutions and the feedback on the different programmes undertaken by the college provide adequate material for the assessment of the quality of the performance of the institution.

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students. The outreach programmes of the college are undertaken by the different cells operating in the college. However, the college does not undertake activities that require heavy financial implications for want of funds. Blood donation campaigns, road safety awareness programmes, awareness campaigns on various issues are a few of the outreach programmes undertaken by the institution. These activities make our students more oriented towards society; develop theirpersonality and responsible citizenship.

Due to lack of funds no significant amount could be allocated in the budgetary provisions of the college so far.

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

The college encourages the faculty and students to participate in extension activities. The Staff council elects coordinators and members for the various fractions functioning in the college. A number of students are connected with NSS activities. Many of which are connected with extension programmes.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

The college encourages extension activities to promote social – justice, social – responsibilities, and good citizenship amongst its students. The local community benefitted immensely through the works put in by our students. Frequent programmes with thye villagers by our college have indeed raised the quality of life of these people.

The NSS unit organized special camps (each for seven days) in following two villages -

- Manipara Sohari, Raiganj, Uttar Dinajpur
- Karandighi gram panchayet 2, Raiganj, Uttar Dinajpur

The special camp performed the following awareness programme -

- Nutrition awareness
- Sanitation awareness
- Environmental awareness

The other programmes organized by NSS of our college are -

- Tree plantation
- Blood donation
- Cleaning of college campus

These activities make our students more oriented towards society to develop their personality and to be a responsible citizen.

The NSS unit also performed cultural programmes which developed an intimate relationship between students and villagers.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students² academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

The virtue of blood donation is driven home through blood donation campaigns, and the college periodically conducts this programme in association with the Blood Bank operating in the Raiganj Hospital.

3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?

The college convenes meetings with local bodies. The meetings discuss various community related topics that must be addressed by the college. The blood donation campaign is done in collaboration with Raiganj Hospital and other volunteer organizations. The institution maintains good rapport with political and social activists and organizations, and assures their involvement in the programmes undertaken by the college.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

During the college hours first aid is available in the college. Whenever students require medical emergencies, the college provides vehicles to reach to the nearest hospital/nursing home for the purpose. Timely, the college NSS organize health camps as a part of their activities.

The college has procured books and reading materials necessary for preparing for competitive examinations which is available for reading for the students in the college library. In addition, information on the availability of such coaching centers in town that provide such services are also made known to the students

> Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.

i. The Institution does run a two year diploma programme in computer education on nominal charges for which the institution has collaborated with WEBEL Informatics limited, undertaken by W.B. Govt. At present more than two hundred students have enrolled for the above course. The time table of the computer course is set in such a way that the students can learn the course during their lien period.

ii. A well-equipped language lab has been setup by the Institution for enhancing the communication skills of the students. In relation to this special spoken English class is also organized weekly by the English department with certain amount of help offered by other departments.

Support for "slow learners"

Each department of our institution takes initiative to provide additional coaching classes. These are conducted by the departments concerned after regular scheduled working hours.

At the beginning of the tenure of the new Governing body (G.B), different sub committees are formed to look after the academic as well as administrative affairs. Full-time teaching members of committees headed by teachers as convener are recommended by Principal/TIC and forwarded to G. B. for consideration. Principal/TIC in consultation with the non-teaching staff includes names of non-teaching members in those different committees. In this way various sub- committees are finally formed in G.B. meeting. There are some committees related to administrative affairs which are solely formed by G.B. Principal/TIC displays and circulates all those committees among the teaching and nonteaching staff. The conveners of the different committees communicate the requisite information to the respective members through official notice to hold meeting and take course of action to design and implement our quality policy and plan. Thus we try our best to materialize our mission, vision and objectives. Meanwhile we also analyze the progress of activities of different sub-committees in T.C. meeting as well as in G.B. meeting.

The Principal/TIC is the Head of the Institution and he bears the ultimate responsibility for the smooth running of the collage. The role of the Principal/TIC of the Collage is multidimensional. As the Head of the Institution the Principal/TIC is responsible for both the academic and administrative functioning of the college. He prepares the agenda for Governing Body meetings and places it before the Body. Academic and administrative matters require Body's approval and the Principal/TIC is responsible for executing its decisions. He is also responsible for all correspondence with the Governing Body, Government of West Bengal, the Central Government, University Grants Commission, the Gour Banga University and different stakeholders of the college. The Principal/TIC receives reports from the different College Committees, which offer advice to him in matters defined in the terms of reference of their functions. The subcommittees related to academic as well as administrative affairs formulate their action plan in their meeting and then it is discussed in GB for implementation in reality in finalizing strategic plan the college takes the matter as follows:

Interaction with stakeholders:

Stakeholders take specific plan of action so as to overcome the problems that arises in implementation. However, in most of the cases the college gets cooperation from the entire stakeholder like students, parents, public representatives, teachers and non-teaching staff.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research in inputs and consultation with stakeholders: Our institution is gradually expanding on all axes in spite of our input student quality especially in science stream is not up to the mark. Time to time we counsel students and try our best to assure the quality. We provide well equipped laboratory to the students. Based on need, books are made available in the library to upgrade their knowledge in all spheres. In the field of sports we have playground and a very well including volley ball court and basketball court for the fulfilment of the desired need of the student. In this way they are benefitted and motivated in the concerned field.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence:

The college authority regularly encourages teachers to upgrade their knowledge by way of attending refresher and orientation courses, seminar and workshop etc. Authority also encourages organizing workshop and seminar, lecture by eminent persons in different conventional as well as non conventional subjects. The college encourages teachers in research. Some of our teachers have completed MRP and some of them are continuing.

Other Organizational Issues:

As such no notable change has been taken place in the organization in the recent past except formation of some committees on emerging issues like Internal quality assurance, sexual harassment etc. Altogether our organization runs like a family and all members of which have significant contribution to its growth.

In the beginning of the academic year, a self-mapping exercise is conducted for the staff. The exercise exposes the strengths and challenges of each of the personnel to draw a potential map, which gives insight to the management, for the distribution of responsibilities. The head of the institution appoints the convener for various committees with the consent of the governing body, and further nominates the members of committees in consultation with the Teachers council and non-teaching staff based on the potential map. The faculty members are informed about their duties and responsibilities by the head of the institution in the scheduled staff meeting and departmental brief. The administrative staff is given a job map along with the roles and responsibilities. The conveners usually submit the reports of achievements to the head of the institution.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top of the management?

- Management form an academic subcommittee to conduct admission, examination, analyzes the unit test result time to time to maintain quality as well as to take measure for betterment. They also hold an annual meeting where they analyze the University result with respect to previous one.
- Routine subcommittee prepares the routine for each session and they try their best to optimal use of the laboratories and class room as well as the teachers.
- Seminar and research subcommittee helps and request the different teachers and departments to organize seminar and workshop which is needful to the student as well as society.
- Computer subcommittee looks after the computer and internet facilities in the campus and ICT teaching learning system.

- Library advisory committee headed by Principal/TIC look after the learning resources in the campus. They also upgrade the books of library as per need of student as well as the teachers.
- Examination subcommittee makes proper arrangement to conduct all the examination smoothly.
- Career guidance cell guides the students for higher studies as well as for job. They also circulate the notices of entrance test of different Institution for studies and also enlighten them about the examination.
- Student aid fund and free studentship subcommittee try its best to provide the financial help to the right person among our students.
- Games and sports subcommittee looks after games and sports affairs of the college.
 Select students, teams to participate inter and inter university sports meet and athlete meet.
- Magazine and cultural subcommittee help to publish the magazine each year and look after the cultural affairs of the college. Select the team and students to participate inter and inter university competition.
- Disciplinary subcommittee try to maintain discipline in the campus; if any nuisance occurs they promptly take action and put appropriate measure to overcome the situation.
- Anti-ragging and grievance subcommittee actively interact with students to help them sort out their problems. It entertains both registered and verbal problems about ragging and grievances.
- UGC subcommittee handles the matters related to the UGC grants.
- Internal assessment subcommittee collects the internal marks and compiles and then sends it to Gour Banga University.
- Extension activities subcommittee arrange community service programmes with the active participation of NSS, NCC, ECO-CLUB, Red-Ribbon club and other stakeholders.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college grooms the function of all the subcommittees related with the academic affairs by maintaining close and friendly relation with the faculties. Principal/TIC (Secretary of GB) enquires, encourages and guides the subcommittees frequently to execute their assigned job to get the better output.

The following are some areas where delegation of authority is ensured for decentralized governance system

- Preparation of academic calendar and lesson plan for the teachers.
- ✤ In setting up programme for unit test.
- Preparation of book list when Librarian invites list of books to be purchased
- Purchase of laboratory Equipment subject to the amount allotted by GB.
- Measures taken by the department to improve the attendance of student.
- Librarian independently run and upgrades the library in view of the Library Advisory Committee decision.

Our College has formed IQAC cell, for attending and assuring the quality and standards at all level. A number of mechanisms have been taken to translate quality to its various units by the college. The plans and policies are geared up at the meeting of IQAC which are recommended to the G.B for consideration. The Governing body, after due discussion, try to implement the same to increase the infrastructure with desired standard.

All the departments have undergone SWOT analysis for their respective department which is helpful for preparing perspective plan. In order to formulate the strategy of development discussions are made with subcommittees each and every developmental work. We have sub-committees like state Govt. Grants and UGC grants. These subcommittees collect information about State Govt. Grants and UGC Grants for the development of HEI. First they generate perspective plan for development of the college and then they make necessary correspondence to the respective funding authority for sanctioning the grants for that purpose.

Some aspects of perspective plans of the College are as follows:

- There will be more facilities to encourage ICT enabled learning.
- Our career counseling cell will be working to help the students to put them in high positions in the job profiles.
- Students will be encouraged to attend more seminars, workshops, conference, etc and also there will be organizing with the sister concern.
- Reconstruction of boys' hostel, construction of staff quarter in near future.
- ◆ To construct an auditorium with gallery facility and modern multimedia system.
- Physical extension of library, enhancement of number of books & journals; Reading room in cubicle system.
- ◆ Arrangement of entrepreneurship training in a regular manner
- ✤ Wi-Fi in the campus.

IQAC of Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya has formed a Research and Consultancy cell for dealing with the task of:

b) Supplying relevant information regarding UGC Projects to the faculty members.

c) Planning for improvement of the existing infrastructure for the ongoing Major and Minor Research Projects in the College.

d) Holding seminars and workshops to create awareness about this aspect of academic activity.

Community Engagement

Through the Counselling by NSS the College has been very active in rendering community services details of which had been stated in Criterion III. Most important is that the students under the leadership of faculty members are now going to the society in order to extend their helping hand to boost the moral and means of the common people as a whole.

Human Resource Management

The institution has a recruitment policy and a strategy as follows.

Policy: Identifying the expertise, developing, reviving, updating competency of the staff besides continuous monitoring and evaluation.

Strategy: Recruitment of permanent full time teachers is done with the recommendation of West Bengal College Service Commission. Part-Time teachers are recruited by the board

formed following the guidelines prescribed by Gour Banga University which consists of HOD, one university recommended subject expert, one GB nominee and the Principal. The details of recruitment of other teachers along with the non-teaching members have been discussed elsewhere of this report. Quality improvement for teaching staff is ensured by organizing seminar and workshop, allowing the faculty to participate in orientation programme and refresher course. Moreover, faculties are encouraged to go for further studies as well as to conduct various research works in their respective and interdisciplinary fields. After all, a very healthy and cordial working environment is provided which motivate staffs to render their best services.

Industry Interaction:

As a part of curriculum, those pursuing B.Voc. Course have scope of attending internship; that gives ample opportunity of industrial exposure.

6.2.5: How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The management interacts with the Principal/TIC periodically. The Principal/TIC and President of GB collect information regarding the teaching quality, curriculum, extracurricular activities and infrastructural development etc. through the feedback from teachers, students and the guardian. In the meeting of the GB the information gathered from different sources are discussed with the participating members. After thorough discussion and deliberation, the existing facilities and activities of the institution are reviewed and measures are taken for improving their performance.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes? In our Institution participatory management is the key. The Governing Body is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff in improving and implementation of the institutional process. The authority, through the Principal/TIC, involves the staff members in various activities and decision making process related to the curricular, extracurricular and administrative development of the college. The staff members get involved themselves through various subcommittees. The representatives of each committee are free to give suggestions and opinions to the Principal/TIC who works as bridge with GB. These suggestions are taken into consideration before making any decisions.

Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya keeps on working for the frequent improvisation of the institution. Last Year, the GB approved Academic subcommittee passed the following resolutions in the meeting of the Teachers' Council:

- Digitalize the library system and computerized office management system.
- ✤ Installation of CC TV in the campus.

The college has created a well-defined mechanism for obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance and quality of the institution. The students' feedback forms are used and suggestion boxes are kept for students, alumni and parents. The inputs are obtained from them which are further analyzed to improvise the overall competency of the students in a positive manner.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

At the Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya stress is laid on improving the pedagogical skills of the faculty members. Towards these effects a number of steps such as seminars, workshops are conducted. The college grants leaves for the faculty who are willing for higher studies and permit them to participate in seminars and workshop to upgrade their knowledge. As per UGC norm teachers are deputed to participate refresher courses and orientation programme for their up gradation and promotion. Authority also sends the non-teaching members in computer training to upgrade them for optimal utilization of their efficiency.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college has its own rules regarding the faculty empowerment. As per these rules, all the staff members are suggested to attend conferences, seminars, workshops, exchanging the research activities, orientation courses, refresher courses and other training programmes. The Principal takes a close review of the teachers through various mechanisms and motivates the teachers for organizing seminars, workshops and for undertaking MRP. The Principal try to create a good impact among the teachers for submitting proposal to the UGC for MRP grant.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The institution adopts a comprehensive mechanism guided by UGC for the appraisal of thee faculty members. In this step the faculty members are given a self-appraisal format to appraise themselves during the course of their promotion based on the given criteria. It gives a comprehensive evaluation of teachers. The result of this assessment is discussed in the screening committee which consists of the Principal/TIC, one DPI nominee and one University nominee. In this way performance of the teachers is assessed by the authority.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

There is no formal system of reporting of the performance appraisal of the teacher. However, the Principal/TIC informally talks to the teacherconcerned about his/her performance if necessary.

- The College has a credit Cooperative Society that meets financial requirements of the staff to some extent. Hassle-free system of investing and borrowing money is helpful to all. Group Insurance for the staff and rented accommodation within campus are a few other facilities provided to the employees.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

For retaining the faculty a conductive working environment in provided. Incremental benefit in the line of Government order is given to all the permanent staff. The College arranges special leave and other facilities for research purpose.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The Governing Body of the College, which is the premier body in the hierarchy to monitor the functioning of the College, has constituted a Development Committee comprising of a group of teachers along with some technical persons, to devise plan, implement them and keep an eye on their progress. Later on, under the aegis of the University Grants Commission the committee has been revamped and renamed as Planning Board, with same function. This Board also watches over the UGC fund utilization under different proposals, monitoring the implementation process and ensuring that the work is completed properly. Moreover, there is also a particular Professor, entrusted with the electrical works related matters. Bursar is to check the appropriateness of different expenditure.

Already two proposals are already implemented. Recently the governing body has taken the resolution to implement the third one.

The IQAC has several external members who contribute to the development for the professional guidance.

Prof. Bikash Roy of University of Gour Banga is the university nominee in IQAC. He brought the first Folklore Congress to our College and organised a national Level conference on Folklore Studies for the first time in North Bengal. Information of this National-level event is provided in the chapter-III.

Mr. Migsang Yalmoo, State Bank of India (Karnajora Branch) is also part of the IQAC. He has attended the meetings and has urged us to explore possibility of jointly holding awareness camps in the campus regarding women safety and importance of hygiene with the State Bank of India.

d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

Existing students actively and cordially cooperate in the implementation of feedback mechanism and guardians-teachers meeting.

e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

At first IQAC hold meeting, where Principal is the chair person. So the decision taken by IQAC is already in his knowledge. He passes it to the next G.B. meeting to approve and sanction the necessary requirements to implement those decisions. After that IQAC recommended the names of staff to engage/assign to implement those decisions. As a

chair person of IQAC he accepts that committee and requests them to start course of action for implementation.

Yes, Institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The operation has been done through various administrative subcommittee frameworks. Each committee is responsible for quality assurance in their respective area of specialization and these sub-committees are monitored by NAAC, IQAC and Governing Body of the institution. Teacher's council put forward suggestions about academic matters to the Principal/TIC. Election commission also does the same for Students Union Election. The function of various sub-committees has been stated in para 6.1.8.

The institution always makes sure that the decisions based on the findings of the IQAC are fully adhered to. The academic as well as the administrative working is further smoothened by conducting time to time informal training for the teaching and nonteaching staff. Teaches are advised to monitor the workflow of the competitive colleges and thereby to improve their interpersonal skill.

Yes, the academic audit of the college is done by the affiliating University of which the college provides required information in the prescribed format supplied by the University.

The College is affiliated to the Gour Banga University, and approved by UGC, New Delhi. All compliances are made as per the requirements of these two bodies from time to time.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

As the college emphasizes more on grooming the students in to professionals, highly qualified and experienced faculties are been appointed. As per the suggestion of the IQAC, teaching methods implemented with ICT presentations as much as possible. The college insists, as part of the curriculum, students to do assignments and class tests on various topics and the teachers evaluate each student based on it to develop and improve academic programmes. The institution has a well defined mechanism to keep an eye on the learning outcomes. The schedule and timetable of the classes and tutorials are finalized in the beginning of the academic session. The tutorials and assignments are corrected within a short duration and the marks are entered in the register, which keeps track of the academic progress of the students. Based on the participation in the class and the marks scored in the tutorials and assignments, the student level is judged by the staff member and appropriate action is taken.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policy mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

Through the college website www.snmraiganj.in the institution communicated its quality assurance policies, mechanisms, outcomes and other events to the external stakeholders. The institution has created various committees, alumni association, parents' body etc. All the decisions made by the IQAC are uploaded in these communities and the feedback from the Alumni, stakeholder and parents are taken in to consideration. As per the interest of the alumni and the students the institution uploads the examination dates, results and information regarding other improvements is uploaded in the college website.

- Considering the vision, mission and objectives of the college and the thrust of Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya, policies are formed and reviewed according to the time and need.
- The mode of functioning is based on the principles of cordiality, rapport and mutual understanding.
- The College has a four NSS unit which taka action Plan in place and is effected through regular training of the students by improvising their leadership skills and create and awareness to utilize their skills for the benefit of the country.
- Encouragement of competent and dedicated faculty in order to retain their services.
- Parent-teacher meeting hold in regular interval.
- Feedback from parents, students, faculty and non-teaching staff are collected and analyzed at regular interval in order to ensure optimize the outcome.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

No, the college does not have any standard mechanism for carrying out Green Audit of its college campus and facilities. But the college takes utmost care to keep the campus clean and eco-friendly. The college has been declared Polythene free zone. The students are made aware of the drastic consequences which mankind will have to face in case we do not take steps to protect the environment.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

• Energy conservation:

Energy conservation is a prerequisite for eco-friendly practices. The concern for energy conservation prevails among both the staff and the students. Special attention is given so that by the end of regular College hours, all electronic and electrical installations are immediately switched off and the devices are unplugged. The use of generators at the time of power cut and that of the emergency power supply is kept at an optimal level. Effort has also been taken to supplant the high energy consuming lamps with modern energy efficient CFL lamps and tubes.

• Use of renewable energy:

The College has installed a 25kva capacity solar plant project for uninterrupted power supply.

- Water harvesting: Nil

- Efforts for Carbon neutrality:

Judicious use of Natural Gas by the Departments of Chemistry, Canteen and Biological Sciences, ensuring minimum purchase of natural gas to mitigate risk tolerance to price changes. Moreover in order to increase the carbon neutrality within the college, initiatives towards regular plantation of trees plays a significant role. Further waste paper, and other waste material are not burnt. These are disposed off as municipal waste.

• Plantation:

The College has taken measures to make the environment green through regular plantation drives.

• Hazardous waste management:

Hazardous waste, which poses a threat to the environment, is primarily generated in the laboratories of the department of Chemistry and biological sciences. As the use of materials causing such waste cannot be avoided as they are mandatory part of the syllabi, earnest care is taken to eliminate the production of hazardous waste or minimize the amount of waste for disposal by recycling, re-using and/or recovering the waste.

• e-waste management: Nil

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Distance Education: Opening of distance learning courses in the college to provide opportunity to those who have missed the opportunity of taking advantage of conventional mode of learning and to provide equal educational opportunities for higher education through distance mode for a large segment of the population, including those in employment who wish to upgrade their education or acquire knowledge in different fields of study. The need of distance education learning was felt by the college because many students left their educational programmes in the mid of the programmes due to economic and other compulsions. For such students, it was not possible to continue their education in traditional settings of the college such as classroom teaching in regular way.

Introduction of distance learning courses will help the students to pursue higher education because it will lessen the time-constraints imposed by personnel responsibilities and commitments. Therefore, The College has established linkage with Directorate of Distance Education of Rabindra Bharati University (DDE-RBU), Kolkata for extending higher education to the needy ones. Presently, through the study centre of the University, the college is providing post-graduate degree in many disciplines.

Vocational Education: In West Bengalunemployment is one of the major problems. Thisproblem may be to some extent tackleby introducing Vocational education and training in secondary and higher secondary labels. Vocation education is a system which aims at providing recipients with the necessary knowledge and skills to exercise a profession in order to make self-employment. As a part of West Bengal Government initiativesthe college has been introduced vocational education training centre to give students technical knowledge in several disciplines.

English Language Lab: English language lab has been setup to develop communication skills and interaction power among the student so that they can easily face and overcome problems in their professional life.

Academic Block and E-book: College has setup new academic block for uninterrupted academic session and set up E-book system in central library so that students can access their need easily.

Save energy: Centralized power switches are installed at every classroom. When the classroom is not in use, the centralized power switch could be turned off to switch off all bulbs and other electrical appliances.

Admission Process: Online transparent admission system is introduced. It has made the entire process easy and less time-consuming for stake holders.

Library facilities: Renovation of infrastructure and computerisation of library and other improvements: The library has been renovated and reorganised for maximum utilisation of space. Computerisation of library is under process to ensure computerised transactions

and access to E-journals etc. The automated processing is being carried out using SOUL - 0.2 Software to acquire INFLIBNET facilities.

Computer literacy programme: The College has organized compulsory computer literacy programme within college hours for the 1st year students to impart knowledge of basic computer skills.

Physical training Centre: College established gymnasium for students and employees So, that they can use it for maintaining their physical fitness.

In education, the term exhibition refers to projects, presentations, or products through which students "exhibit" what they have learned, usually as a way of demonstrating whether and to what degree they have achieved expected <u>learning standards</u> or <u>learning objectives</u>. An exhibition is typically both a learning experience in itself and a means of evaluating academic progress and achievement. Exhibition gives valuable experience, stimulate interest, curiosity, and desire to explore the mysteries of the world to the student. Students can learn, understand, and apply their acquire knowledge.

Admission is the most important component of an educational institution. The challenge of any educational institution lies in the successful implementation of the entire admission process. There must always be an effort to make the admission process hassle-free, less time consuming with provisions for lesser errors. Complete Online Admission Process has been initiated to reduce the hassles, human mistakes and labour involved in the Manual Admission Process.

3. The context

Most of the students in Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya are first generation learner and Uttar Dinajpur district in West Bengal bears poor literacy rate where our college is located. So, exhibition can develop people awareness and educational values.

Though Raiganj Surendranath Mahavidyalaya is situated in an urban locality, the students come predominantly from the rural background. The Manual Method of admission process involving off-line form distribution and submission had become the expected mode of Admission. Our college, however, realized that complete on-line admission process is the reality and there must not be any hesitation in embracing technology in the admission process. With this positive mindset, the college authority attempted to introduce online admission process partially in the session 2014-2015 and completely from the session 2015-2016 and finally complete Online Admission process became the reality.

4. The Practice

a) Annual Model Exhibition Competition:

The Annual Model Exhibition Competition is held in the month of December or January every year for the participation of the students of the college. The exhibition is meant for the innovative demonstration of the applied aspects of bookish knowledge. Learning in every discipline, as imparted to the young souls, is not a treasury of theories, formulas and discourses to the stored is seclusion with the current of day-to-day life. The exhibition is conceived as a concrete audio- visual illustration of the relevant points of what they learn of the real affairs of life. Models, charts and pictures are used to explain the theme orally by the participants. Each department concentrates on two or three themes which bring down theoretical knowledge to the solid ground of applied utility. Credit goes to the effects that impress the spectators by novelty of conception, dexterity in designing models and power of oral interpretation. Comments of the spectators are recorded and a panel of judges is made to give verdict on the merit of the total package, of presentation of each participating department.

b) Introduction of Complete Online Admission Process

Partial Online Admission Process was initiated from 2014-2015 session, applicants were allowed to submit the forms on-line but the requisite fee has to be deposited in the college and counselling process was organized in the college campus. However, the college authority soon realized that for effective admission process these are but minor steps; the immediate necessity being the introduction of Complete Online Admissions Process. After many deliberations, debates and discussions, the process finally began its journey in 2014-2015 sessions. In this complete online Admission Process, all admission related notifications are uploaded in the college website. As soon as the results of different 10+2 examinations are published, the college notifies of the dates in which the applicants can submit the online application forms. Forms can be submitted only on-line in the college website <u>www.snmraiganj.in</u>. After submitting the forms on-line and taking prints of the "challan" copies the applicants have to pay the requisite fees at any branch of the designated bank (Allahabad Bank of India in the last two sessions). The technological side of this online admission process is maintained by a competent outsourced agency. Necessary helpdesks are provided in the college campus both by this outsourced agency and the Students' Union. The Admission Committee monitors the entire process. The entire Merit Panel is prepared Online. Entire admission process with necessary counselling are also maintained online.

5. Evidence of Success

Exhibition competition caters to the young pupils'need for an environment of creative activity, cooperative enterprise and competitive habit that is constructive and healthy. The sense of enthusiasm that this annual occasion produces in the students is a welcome phenomenon in the campus life of the young people. Serious contemplation on the themes and alert planning of the method of presentation certainly stimulate the student's creative and perceptive faculties which is the ultimate aim of every discipline of learning.

In spite of the initial reservations, the Complete Online Admission Process has turned out to be a complete success. This has indeed lessened the rigorous labour involved in the offline process. The entire process has become smoother with less requirement of humanpower. It has also become less time consuming for both the staff and the students.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Preparation for the exhibition prior to the few days long occasion proves to be a lengthy and chaotic affair. A number of students, who get busy in making necessary arrangements, have to stay away from regular classes sometimes. Insufficiency of teaching days is the major obstacle in the way of allowing adequate space for preparation.

Initially, there were reservations from all quarters, about turning the all-important Admission Process completely online. It was argued, not without some justification, that students in remote areas cannot access internet and hence it would not be advisable to turn the entire admission process online. However, it was decided in several meetings, both with the staff and the student representatives that if helpdesk facilities can be introduced in the college, then this problem can be minimized. Moreover, it was argued that, if the students can come to the college to collect and submit forms then they could also move to any cyber-cafe in the city to access the internet. The basic resource required was regular maintenance of the college website. It was taken care of the agency which has been given the NTA -d9 Solution for website maintenance and conducting online admission. The Help Desk facilities are made available in college office. Contract is also made with a government sector bank so that applicants can submit the application fees to any branch of the bank. Allahabad Bank of India has been given the said contract.



- Regulatory Council/Body [such as UGC, NCTE, AICTE, MCI, DCI, BCI, etc.] and
- 3. The affiliation and recognition [if applicable] is valid as on date.

In case the affiliation / recognition is conditional, then a detailed enclosure with regard to compliance of conditions by the institution will be sent.

It is noted that NAAC's accreditation, if granted, shall stand cancelled automatically, once the institution loses its University affiliation or Recognition by the Regulatory Council, as the case may be.

In case the undertaking submitted by the institution is found to be false then the accreditation given by NAAC is liable to be withdrawn. It is also agreeable that the undertaking given to NAAC will be displayed on the college website.
